With a record of 1-4 (0-1 in the Central Suburban League South), the varsity football team continues its season under the direction of head coach Curtis Tate, who expressed his uncertainty as to the end result of the Wolves' season due to their inconsistent record so far. With three losses, including a loss to district rival Niles North, the Wolves are going to have a long season.

The Wolves lost their first game against Vernon Hills with a score of 33-19. However, the next week proved to lighten the load as the Wolves beat Zion Benton 54-37 in their home opener. The game against Niles North marked the first ever Skokie Skirmish in which the winning team received bragging rights for a whole year as well as a trophy.

Unfortunately, the Wolves lost to the Vikings 64-63. The game was the highest scoring in the four decades of the distrct rivalry. The game was also significant for Niles West running back, senior Leonard Panion who beat alumnus and Pittsburgh Steelers running back, Rashard Mendenhall's record of most yards in a game. According to the Chicago Sun-Times, Panion ran for 425 yards with 36 attempts and six touchdowns. His game against Niles North was the third game in a row that he ran for more than 200 yards. The Wolves played Deerfield last Friday and also lost the game with a score of 28-14. Despite the sub .500 record, Tate still has a lot of confidence in the team.

Reyes concurs. "We worked incredibly hard this off season and during the summer. We use each practice to fix our mistakes and go from there," Reyes said. According to Reyes, all team members are recurring from minor injuries and sicknesses and getting ready for conference games.

Despite the tough conference, Ackman expects a lot from the team. "We plan to win conference, get to sectionals, but mainly, win state," Ackman said. Reyes agrees. "Our communication and trust in one another leads us to expect a conference win for the second year in a row and possibly state," Reves said.

The Wolves' success this season comes a lot from the successful practices according to Reyes. "Although New Trier remains a tough competition, we are ready to face off against them," Reyes commented.

Two weeks ago, the Wolves participated in the Rockton-Hononegah Tournament. After a saddening loss against Rockford Gullford (2-3) and Collinsville (1-2), the Wolves defeated Rockford Christian (5-1).
