Military Academy. As a high school coach, Hampton coached three state championship teams, two in Colorado and one in

New York, and he coached for five years at Niles, during which time the team captured three Central Suburban League North conference titles, with a record of 23-2 in conference dual meets.

Hampton has been tabbed to coach the U.S. team at the Pan American Championships in July 13-19, 2010 in Manaus, Brazil.
