

## **Research topics class braves cold in name of science**

On Jan. 31, the students of Senior Research Science Topics (SRST) went on an overnight trip to Starved Rock State Park. SRST instructor Neil Koreman brought his 14-student class on a two-hour journey outside of Oglesby, IL in order to introduce them to the tactics of survival.
